Community Visioning Session

Background

The Wachapreague Planning Commission is updating the Wachapreague Comprehensive Plan as required by the Virginia State Code. A community visioning session was held on May 13, 2023, to support this effort. This report summarizes the results of that session. The Commission thanks the Wachapreague Volunteer Fire Company for providing meeting space, the Wachapreague Country Store for providing coffee and supplies, and the Accomack Northampton Planning District Commission for meeting supplies.

Methodology

An informational flyer encouraging participation was posted at the town post office, town hall and mailed to every property owner. The session was held at the Wachapreague Volunteer Fire Company building from 9 am to noon on Saturday May 13, 2023. A total of 20 people attended to share their views on the town's future. A member of the Planning Commission facilitated the session and documented the results.

Attendees worked in four teams to first address "What do we want to see in place ten years from now?" Each team brainstormed and shared ideas then selected their highest priority items. The four teams shared their priorities and participants then identified clusters of similar ideas to develop a shared vision. Details are provided in Appendix A and are summarized in the next section.

The teams then worked to identify challenges to achieving the ten-year vision as well as key opportunities before adjourning.

A Vision for the Future

Please note that vision elements are not listed in any order of priority.

Within ten years residents and visitors will experience:

Expanded retail businesses and dining opportunities at the marinas and commercial districts. Seafood retailers and local entrepreneurs offer a variety of goods and services. Adequate parking is marked and available.

Recreational waterfront opportunities including fishing, crabbing, a birdwatching observation deck and other eco-friendly activities. Controlled lighting and ramps for turtle hatchlings demonstrate the communities' commitment to protecting the environment.

Year-round events such as festivals, seafood and farmers markets, art fairs and town park recreational opportunities. A variety of outdoor public art is enjoyed at various locations.

Public restrooms are available along the waterfront and town parks and facilities.

The new town hall and visitor center provides important information and services to residents and visitors. A town maintenance building protects equipment and records. **The town museum and historic district** highlight the unique natural and historical significance of the area.

Town-wide public sewer serves residents and businesses helping to ensure drinking water from wells is safe and the environment protected.

Communication infrastructure provides free wi-fi throughout the town and reliable cell phone and internet services.

An effective drainage system protects homes and business establishments from rainstorm flooding and minimizes problems created by standing water.

Challenges and Opportunities

Participants worked in teams to brainstorm opportunities for achieving one or more of the vision elements as well as challenges to making the vision a reality.
